Mary Grandfathers Story. June George Pribicevich hake Ohia.

Born 1876 in the small constal village, Zaostrog Palmatia. In 1899 June married Tomica Banovic, also born Zaestrog. A son Fran John was bern the same year. Three years later 1902 June decided to leave his village, and make a start to a new life for his family, so it was New Zealand he chose. Late 1902 he was a passenger on the ill fated Steamship "Elingamite". The ship was on a regular run from Sydney to Avekland, with 58 crew and 139 passengers aboard. Of those passengers, 10 were Dalmatians. On sortunday afternoon on the 8th November 1902, the ship entered a haze which drastically reduced visability - 9:00 am Sunday morning the haze thickened, closing visibility to just Iwo ship lengths. Creeping through the fog, They were on a course for disaster. It was not discovered until years later that the Three Kings Islands were wrongly charted. The bow struck rocks off the West Island at 10.40 am, Captain Atwood was left with no option but to give the order to abandon ship and it sunk in 20 minutes Jure was one of III passengers who survived, At an enguiry that followed the tragedy, Jure was the spokesman on behalf of the Dalmatians. total of 45 lives were lost from drowning or exposure | 28 passengers and 17 crew members. Following his arrival in New Zealand June Chene Known as George began work as a gundigger. In 1908 George's wife Tomica and son John arrived here. George bought a farm at the top end of Pekerau Rd hake Ohia. He built his family agnoll home and then set about developing the steep scrubband property. The couple had three more children born here plus John, who married twice - Mihaljevich then Blackmore. 2 Katièbi 1908 later married Fran Grubisa 3 Barbarab, 1910 narried Peter Hity Mihaljevich 4. George Junior b. 1912, died a young man in 1932.
